

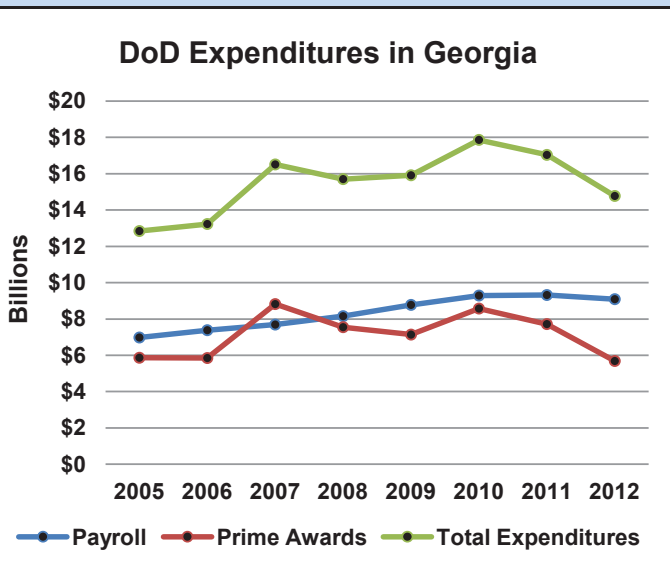

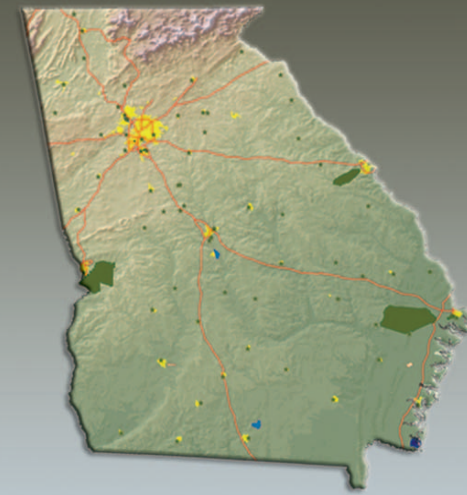

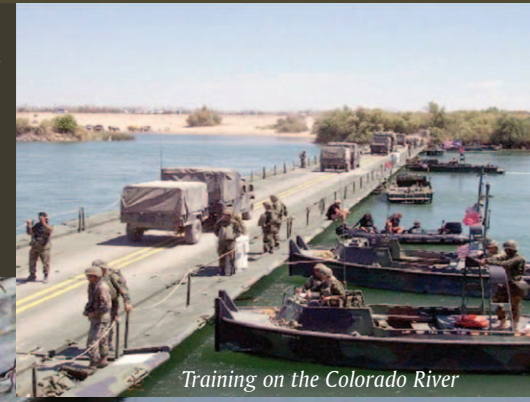


## Did You Know In GEORGIA

## National Guard and Other Reserve Components

The Guard and Reserve organize, train, and equip citizen soldiers/airmen to ensure their rapid mobilization for duties within the state, nation, and around the world. While all Reserve Components have a federal mission to augment active duty forces in times of crises, the Guard has the additional, unique mission of serving the Governor during state emergencies. Guard and Reserve units are stationed throughout the state.



## Robins Air Force Base

Robins is home to Warner Robins Air Logistics Center, the 78th Air Base Wing, and over 60 other units that contribute to the Air Force war fighting team. It is the largest industrial complex in Georgia, employing a work force of over 25,000 civilian, contractor and military members.



## Fort Gordon

Fort Gordon employees approximately 30,000 military and civilian personnel and is a mainstay of the Augusta-Richmond County economy. The mission of the Army Signal Center and Fort Gordon encompasses training, doctrine, force integration and mobilization. The Signal Center conducts specialized instruction for all Signal Regiment military and Army civilians, and provides doctrine and training development support of publications.



## Fort Benning

Fort Benning is a self-sustaining military community. It encompasses 182,000 acres and supports over 120,000 military, civilian and retired military citizens. The installation is capable of deploying combat-ready forces by air, rail and highway. In 2005 Benning became home to the Maneuver Center of Excellence, providing trained, adaptive, and ready soldiers and leaders, committed to the Army profession.



## Fort Stewart

Fort Stewart encompasses 280,000 acres, including the Army's longest East Coast runway at Hunter Army Airfield. The installation is close to two deep water ports: Savannah, GA, and Charleston, SC. Tank, field artillery, helicopter gunnery and small arms ranges operate simultaneously year round at this Army installation.



## Marine Corps

### Logistics Base Albany

Albany supports East Coast installations, and rebuilds and repairs ground-combat and combat support equipment. One of Albany's most important facilities is the Marine Corps Logistics Bases' Maintenance Center, with a sister installation in Barstow, CA. The center is home base for the commander of the Marine Corps Logistics Bases, including Barstow, CA, and Jacksonville, FL.



## Moody Air Force Base



Established in World War II, Moody long served as a major pilot-training base. Moody's 9,300 acres house the 23rd Wing, the only active-duty combat search and rescue wing in the Air Force. The 23rd executes worldwide close air support, force protection, and combat search and rescue operations in support of humanitarian interests, U.S. national security and the global war on terrorism.



## Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay

Kings Bay encompasses approximately 16,000 acres, and supports more than 9,000 military, civilian and contract personnel, as well as a variety of threatened or endangered species. The base is the U.S. Atlantic Fleet's home port for U.S. Navy Fleet ballistic missile nuclear submarines.
