Guam sits at the top of the Marianas Trench, the world's deepest ocean site. It's like diving the world's tallest mountain.



Guam's Most Popular Dives




Dive Site	Depths	Views
1. Pati Point	45-150+ ft.	Unusual coral growth
2. The Pinnacle	Starts at 135 ft.	Sea turtles, schooling shoals of jacks and barracuda
3. Northern Caves	20-60 ft.	Cave diving goes inland to a clear fresh water spring and jungle pool
4. Double Reef	20-80 ft.	Thick coral gardens, including Napoleon wrasse protected by an outer reef
5. Gun Beach	20-120 ft.	Large coral heads, abundant marine life
6. Tumon Bay	3-12 ft.	Ideal spot for fishwatchers with low reef flats and patch coral, coral thickets, bright white sand flats
7. Hospital Point	35-100+ ft.	Cliffline dives, deep reef adorned by colorful sea fans, skipjacks, tuna and swirling shoals of baitfish along with the occasional humpback whale
8. Piti Bomb Holes	2-35 ft.	Natural reef, wide variety of fish, shells and inner reef corals
9. Apra Harbor	to 150 ft.	See page 3 for map and details.
10. Blue Hole	60-130 ft.	Vertical chimney, soft and hard corals, sea whips, cardinal dive fish
11. The Crevice	80-130 ft.	Sea fans, coral-lined walls, large pelagic fish
12. Shark Pit	10-90 ft.	Graveyard for WWII military tanks and equipment, occasional small reef sharks
13. Nimitz Beach	10-90 ft.	Graveyard for WWII military tanks and equipment, occasional small reef sharks
14. Hap's Reef	25-60 ft.	Anemones, tame eels and schooling fish
15. Gaan Point	35-70 ft.	Large coral heads and a variety of sea anemone, WWII shipwrecks and mini-wall
16. Coral Gardens	15-55 ft.	Variety of coral sites with pillars up to 25 ft. high, caverns and brilliant sandy bottom
17. Toguan Bay	to 60 ft.	Spinner dolphins, manta rays; good night diving
18. Cocos Wall	30-300 ft.	Corals, fish, and miniature octopus; Manila Galleon
19. Cocos Lagoon	2-35 ft.	Corals, fish, and miniature octopus; Manila Galleon
20. Talofofo Bay	to 50 ft.	Japanese ammunition ship



Guam offers a variety of diving opportunities for beginning, intermediate and advanced divers. Beach diving is available from several sites. A variety of small six-person to large 40-person boats are available and most operate daily. On boat dives, divers have the opportunity to visit exotic dive sites and experience the exceptional visibility of Guam's mid-ocean location.


Apra Harbor Dives



Dive Site	Depths	Views
1. Dry Dock Reef	15-75 ft.	Majestic Mtaghorn coral
2. Western Shoals	5-50 ft.	Honeycomb combination of branching and plating coral, variety of sponges and Pacific reef fish
3. Kitsugawa Maru	60-140 ft.	Coal-fired, steam driven, single engine ship
4. Tokai Maru	40-125 ft.	Japanese freighter torpedoed by submarine attack in 1943; sits beside the SMS Cormoran
5. SMS Cormoran	70-125 ft.	WWI German auxiliary, cruiser scuttled by crew in 1917; sits next to Tokai Maru
6. Dogleg Reef	2-30 ft.	Variety of corals, trucks and jeeps shallow depths for photography
7. American Tanker	55-110 ft.	Concrete WWII transport barge
8. SeeBee Junkyard	25-50 ft.	Remnants from WWII construction projects including bulldozers, large piping systems
9. Hidden Reef	55-75 ft.	Healthy, vibrant coral, giant sponges, schooling fusiliers, the occasional hammerhead shark
10. Finger Reef	5-60 ft.	Thousands of small reef fish, attractive stony coral
11. GabGab Reef	2-90 ft.	Coral formations and sloping reefs

Tokai Maru/Cormoran – Tokai Maru and Cormoran dive site is the only place in the world where sunken ships from two different world wars sit touching.

Depth to top of Tokai - 42 feet
 Depth to top of Cormoran - 70 feet



Guam's Wonders on Land



Guam's shores beckon with lots to see and do while you're getting ready for your diving adventures, or resting up afterwards.



Hike The Hills – Guam's trails take you from remote beaches to jungle hideaways to waterfalls. Join organized weekend hikes called Boonie Stomps, or go on your own, anytime.



Play on Top of the Water – Guam's warm waters are perfect for wind surfing, parasailing, jet skiing, kayaking, canoeing and fishing. You can even explore the jungle on a river boat.



Get to Know the Locals – Guam's Chamorro people are renowned for their hospitality and warmth. Spend some time at a local restaurant or Chamorro village and see for yourself.



Explore Guam's History – The first Chamorros arrived from the Malay Peninsula around 3,000 BC. Today, you can visit sites to take in petroglyphs and touch latte stones, the foundations for ancient buildings.



Bask on a Beach – Guam is a 32-mile long island ringed by a dazzling array of beautiful white sandy beaches. There's even a beach with star-shaped grains of sand.
