



Virginia JB Little Creek-Story

Facility and Location

Based on the 2005 Base Realignment and Closure decision, Fort Story was transferred to the Navy on October 1, 2009 and became part of Joint Base (JB) Little Creek-Story.

Naval Amphibious Base (NAVPHIBASE) Little Creek, the largest base of its kind in the world, is the major operating station for the amphibious forces of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet. The base's location totals 2,120 acres of land and is sited at the northwest corner of Virginia Beach. NAVPHIBASE Little Creek's mission is to provide continuously improving support and services to operating forces and shore commands. NAVPHIBASE Little Creek includes woodland training areas in support of amphibious operation. Sandy beaches and mudflats provide a realistic scenario for other hands on training.

Fort Story is located at the confluence of the Chesapeake Bay and the Atlantic Ocean, north of the resort area of Virginia Beach. Fort Story occupies an area of approximately 1,450 acres, and approximately 2,000 military personnel and civilians work, live or train there. Fort Story is the only U.S. Army installation to offer the combined features of beach, deep water sea anchorage, and natural terrain required for Logistics Over The Shore training. The post is also the Army's only salt water purification training site for reverse osmosis water purification units. In addition to the active Army units, also stationed at Fort Story are Army Reserve units, Navy active and Reserve units, and a Marine Corps section.
