

National Guard and Other Reserve Components

While all Reserve Components have a federal mission to augment active duty forces in times of crises, the Guard has the additional, unique mission of serving the Governor during state emergencies. Guard and Reserve units are stationed throughout the state.




Fort Meade/National Security Agency

Fort Meade is one of the key military installations in the national capital region and its 56,000 military and civilian employees make it Maryland's largest employer. Fort Meade provides a wide range of services to 95 partner organizations from the DoD, Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, and Coast Guard including such strategically important organizations as the National Security Agency, U.S. Cyber Command, and the Defense Information Systems Agency.



Aberdeen Proving Ground (APG)

Established on the shores of the Chesapeake Bay in 1917, Aberdeen Proving Ground (APG) is the Army's oldest active proving ground. APG covers more than 72,500 acres and is one of the Army's most diversified installations, encompassing more than 60 different tenant activities representing every facet of technology. The installation provides the platform to perform research, development, testing, and evaluation of Army materiel for the Army Communications-Electronics Command, Army Research, Development and Engineering Command, and the Army Test and Evaluation Command. Facilities include research laboratories, state-of-the-art ranges, engineering test courses for wheeled and tracked vehicles, and a wide variety of research and training including chemical and biological defense.



Fort Detrick

Home to the U.S. Army's Medical Research and Materiel Command, Medical Research Institute of Infectious Diseases, and 21st Signal Brigade, Fort Detrick is a vital national biomedical research and development, medical material management, and global telecommunications center. It is also home to other federal agency partners including offices from the Departments of Veterans Affairs, Agriculture, Homeland Security, and Health and Human Services as well as the National Institutes of Health's National Cancer Institute-Frederick.



National Naval Medical Center Bethesda

As a result of the Defense Base Realignment and Closure Act of 2005, NNMC Bethesda, the flagship of the Navy's system of medical centers, will combine with Walter Reed Army Medical Center creating the Walter Reed National Military Medical Center at Bethesda. Changes as part of the realignment include addition of the Traumatic Brain Injury/Post Traumatic Stress Disorder Intrepid Center of Excellence, and dedicated Warrior Transition Brigade Barracks.



Joint Base (JB) Andrews

JB Andrews is home to six Air Force Wings and 50 tenant organizations and supports over 40,000 airmen and families. Mission partners include the base's host 11th Wing, the 113th Wing providing air defense for the capital region, the 79th Medical Wing, the 459th Air Refueling Wing, and the Naval Air Facility. The 89th Airlift Wing, best known for Air Force One, provides worldwide airlift support to the President, Vice President, Cabinet members and dignitaries.



Naval Support Facility (NSF) Indian Head

NSF Indian Head has a history dating back to 1890, when the U.S. Navy established the facility as the Naval Proving Ground with the responsibility for testing naval guns, powder, fuses, and other naval ordnance. One of eight divisions of the Naval Sea Systems Command Warfare Center Enterprise, NSF Indian Head is a major contributor to the nation's knowledge and development of ordnance and weapons systems.



Naval Air Station (NAS) Patuxent River

NAS Patuxent River is the Navy's center of excellence for naval aviation. On 14, 500 acres, it is the Navy's principal research and development, test, evaluation, and engineering support activity for manned and unmanned aircraft, engines, avionics, aircraft support systems, and ship and shore air operations. It is home to 20,000 military and civilian employees and 50 tenant organizations including the Naval Air System Command and Naval Air Warfare Center Aircraft Division.



U.S. Naval Academy/Naval Support Activity Annapolis

Established in 1845 as the undergraduate college of the naval service, the U.S. Naval Academy strives to accomplish its mission to develop midshipmen "morally, mentally, and physically." The Naval Support Activity (NSA) Annapolis command is responsible for the delivery of common operating support services to the Naval Academy Complex, Naval Research Laboratory Chesapeake Beach Detachment, and Commander Naval Security Group at Fort Meade, Maryland.
