
January 1 **1863** Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation. 1892 Ellis Island in New York Harbor opened.



AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH


In 1926, Dr. Carter G. Woodson instituted the first celebrations to raise awareness of African Americans' contributions to history. Fifty years later, this week-long celebration became a month. February was chosen since it celebrated Abraham Lincoln's and Frederick Douglas's birthdays - two Americans who dramatically affected the lives of African Americans.



TUSKEGEE AIRMEN Prior to 1940, African Americans were banned from flying for the U.S. military. Pressure from civil organizations and black press resulted in an all-African American air squadron who became known as the

Tuskegee Airmen, "Tuskegee Airmen" refers to the Army Air Corps program to train African Americans to fly and maintain combat aircraft. This group included pilots, navigators, bombardiers, maintenance and support staff, instructors, and other support staff.

The Tuskegee Airmen overcame incredible prejudice to become one of the most respected aerial fighter groups of WWII. Their achievements paved the way to full U.S. military integration.

National Women's History Month

National Women's History Month was established by presidential proclamation in order to draw attention and improve the focus on women in historical studies. The public celebration of women's history in the U.S. began in 1978 as Women's History Week. In 1987, Congress declared March as National Women's History Month.

Deborah Sampson Gannet (alias Robert Shurtliff) was the first woman known to enlist as a soldier in the American Army in 1782, disguised as a man. She served until late in 1783, when her secret was discovered while being treated for a fever.


The doctor who treated her sent her with a note to Gen. George Washington, who never uttered a word. Gen. Washington ensured she received an honorable discharge from the Army. In 1792, she petitioned for back pay as a former Continental Soldier in the Mass. Line. Her neighbor Paul Revere endorsed the request that was granted by John Hancock, president of the Assembly.


"It would appear to me that any national defense weapon known to be of value should be developed and kept in good working order and not allowed to rust or to be abolished," Capt. Joy Bright Hancock told members of the U.S. Senate in 1947, during

hearings on whether to make women permanent members of the U.S. Armed Services.

Capt. Hancock was among the first group of women ever to serve in the Navy as WWI Yeomen (F). She was a principal voice for women's equality in the military, retiring from active duty in June 1953.

April Dates in History

April 12, 1861 – Confederates under Gen. Beauregard opened fire with 50 cannons upon Fort Sumter in Charleston, South Carolina. The Civil War begins.

April 9, 1865 – The U.S. Civil War ended as Gen. Robert E. Lee surrendered to Gen. Ulysses S. Grant at Appomattox Courthouse. April 14, 1865 – President Abraham Lincoln was shot and mortally wounded.


April 6, 1917 – The United States entered WWI.

April 4, 1949 – The North Atlantic Treaty was signed to protect western nations from Soviet aggression, creating NATO. April 17, 1961 – Bay of Pigs invasion.

Asian Pacific American Heritage Month

In 1979, a congressional proclamation established Asian Pacific American Heritage Week, which was expanded to a monthlong celebration in 1990 under presidential decree.

The month of May was chosen to commemorate two significant events in U.S. history: the arrival of the first Japanese immigrants in the U.S. on May 7, 1843, and the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869. The diversity and common experiences of many ethnic groups are celebrated during Asian Pacific American Heritage Month.



United States Army was an Asian American unit consisting of mainly Japanese Americans who fought in Europe during WWII. 
National American Indian Heritage Month

"Against all odds, America's first peoples have endured, and they remain a vital cultural, political, social, and moral presence," President Clinton noted in 1996. November is now the official month to raise awareness of the contributions American Indians have made in the U.S. This month recognizes hundreds of different tribes and approximately 250 languages and celebrates the history, tradition, and values of American Indians.

lieutenant with the 45th Infantry Division when he received the Medal of Honor for heroic action in 1943. Up against machine gun fire, he and eight men charged the enemy. While suffering from a broken foot, Childers advanced up a hill, single-handedly killing two snipers, silencing two machine gun nests, and capturing an enemy mortar observer. Childers, who retired in 1965, first arrived at Fort Drum, New York (then Pine Camp), on Nov. 8, 1942, to train before going overseas.






