The first meeting of the newly appointed members of the Defense Personnel Support Center's Restoration Advisory Board (RAB) will be held on June 15, 1995. DPSC has prepared this fact sheet to provide more information to its RAB members and the general public on the overall purpose and operation of the RAB.

The Role of the RAB in Environmental Cleanup

Over the last few years, the U.S. Department of Defense has refined its approach to environmental cleanup at military bases that are scheduled for base realignment and closure (BRAC). To provide a partnership approach to the environmental cleanup, the Defense Department has called for the formation of BRAC Cleanup Teams (BCTs) and RABs.



The purpose of the BCT is to direct cleanup activities. The BCT has three members—one each from the base, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), and the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Resources (PaDER). BCT members meet regularly and work as partners and primary decision-makers in the cleanup.

The RAB consists of community and government agency representatives, with all members having equal status. Although the RAB is not a decision-making body, it provides input on the environmental cleanup program and acts as an advisor to the BCT. The RAB is also the focal point for communicating with the public. The purpose of the RAB is to provide a forum for effective two-way communication between community members, DPSC, and regulatory agencies. As an advisory committee, the RAB reviews environmental documents and plans, provides advice and relates community concerns to DPSC, and communicates back to the community. The RAB and DPSC share responsibility for encouraging further public participation and informing the community of upcoming plans.

Selection of RAB Members

Public information meetings were held at DPSC on January 19 and March 16, 1995, to provide information

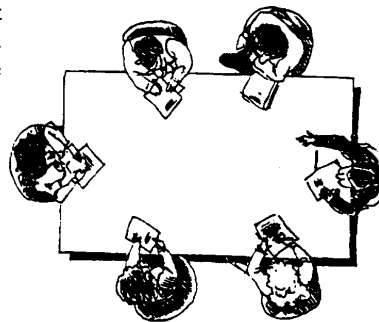
about the RAB and to request applications for membership. DPSC distributed news releases, public notices, and flyers to advertise both meetings. DPSC also made membership applications, fact sheets, and other handouts available at the meetings.



Thirty-five people applied for membership on the RAB. DPSC's Commander, Army Brigadier General Carl H. Freeman, was so encouraged by the enthusiastic response that he offered membership to all 35 applicants. Members include community residents, community leaders, and local employers, in addition to the three members of the BCT.

How the RAB Operates

The RAB operates in an advisory role rather than a decision making role. Beyond this basic guideline, each RAB has the flexibility to establish its own rules of order. One of the first tasks for DPSC'S RAB will be to adopt an initial set of operating rules. Many RABs have adopted the Roberts Rules of Order, while others have used a more informal set of rules. At a minimum, the RAB reviews minutes from prior meetings, follows agendas, takes minutes, and sets future meeting dates and agendas. The RAB will conduct regular meetings, open to the public, at convenient times and locations.



The RAB will have two co-chairpersons. Mr. Bill Stem, the DPSC BRAC Environmental Coordinator, is one co-chair. The other co-chair will be a community

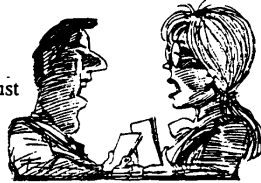

representative from the RAB who is selected by the community RAB members. The co-chairs coordinate the RAB meetings.

reports. Since the RAB is the primary focal point for communicating with the community, a RAB may coordinate community outreach efforts such as newsletters, public information forums, and public meetings. The achievements of the RAB depend on the dedication of its members and the leadership of its co-chairpersons.

- Willingness to forge partnerships



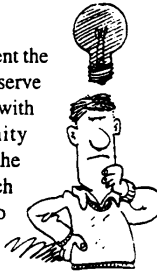
Potential RAB Activities
