What Are Cultural Resources?

What are artifacts?

Object that were used or modified by people.

What is an archaeological site?

A location with evidence of human occupation.

Such as:

- •Tipi rings
- •Historic Buildings or ruins •Rock Cairns
- Artifacts such as pottery or arrowheads
- Rock over hangs & cavesOld sites may be partially
- •Old trash dumps or completely buried.

What do I do if I find an archaeological site or an artifact?

Stop work and Report it to an officer in charge and the Environmental Specialist. Phone number: (XXX) 867-5309

- Flag a protective buffer or avoid conducting activities in the vicinity of the site
- If possible, map the location and take photographs
- Do not dig in this area
- •No heavy equipment in this area
- No collecting artifacts
- Do not disturb stone circles, rock piles, rock art or drawings.
- Avoid historic structures and ruins.
- No graffiti
- No vandalism

For a felony Archaeological Resources Protection Act offense, first time offenders (including military and contractor personnel) can be fined up to \$20,000 and imprisoned for up to one year. Second time felony offenders can be fined up to \$100,000 and imprisoned for up to 5 years.
