#### **Fort Greely**

Fort Greely's 7,200 acres include the primary site of the U.S. Ground-based Midcourse Missile Defense operational site. Most of the soldiers at Fort Greely are assigned to the 49th Missile Defense Battalion and are full-time Alaska Army National Guardsmen. The Army's Cold Regions Test Center is also located at Fort Greely.



#### **Fort Wainwright**

Located in Fairbanks, Fort Wainwright manages 10 percent of the Army's U.S. training lands, with 1.5 million acres. Fort Wainwright's extensive training areas make it one of the Army's premier locations for training in either extreme cold or warm weather, as well as on varied terrain. It is home to the 1st Stryker Brigade Combat Team, 25th Infantry Division, the 16th Combat Aviation Brigade; serves as headquarters for the US Army in Alaska; and supports over 700 retirees.



#### **Eielson Air Force Base**

Eielson Air Force Base occupies 63,195 acres southeast of Fairbanks. It has the northernmost U.S. fighter wing in the world and provides the U.S. with combat ready forces capable of reaching anywhere in the Northern Hemisphere at a moment's notice. Eielson is home to the largest aerial exercise in the Pacific region, held four times a year.



The Guard organizes, trains, and equips citizen-soldiers to ensure their quick unique, servicing both the Governor and the President in time of crisis. The Army and Air National Guard manage 72 operating from military facilities in over 70 Alaska communities.



### Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson (JBER)

JBER is just north of Anchorage and encompasses more than 75,000 acres. JBER is a worldwide power projection base and a key part of the Department of Defense's air & ground hubs in the Pacific. It is home to the Alaskan Command; Alaskan NORAD Region; Eleventh Air Force; 3rd Wing; 673rd Air Base Wing; the Army's 4th Brigade Combat Team (Airborne), 25th Infantry Division, 3rd Maneuver Enhancement Brigade; Alaska National Guard; and joint military training ranges.



#### Navy Region Northwest (NRNW):

Headquartered at Naval Base Kitsap Bangor, Washington, NRNW provides coordination of support functions for Naval operating forces in Alaska, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, and Wyoming. NRNW supports U.S. Navy readiness training in Alaska and the Gulf of Alaska that focus on response to natural disasters, homeland defense and homeland security. Sea lanes near Alaska are critical to the economic health of the United States and throughout the Pacific Rim and



Clear Air Force Station is located about 80 miles southwest of Fairbanks. Its primary mission is to provide Early Warning of Intercontinental and Sea-Launched Ballistic Missiles. It also tracks the more than 22,000 man-made objects orbiting Earth, ensuring the safe and responsible use of space. Clear closely monitors objects re-entering the atmosphere.
