

USNORTHCOM/NORAD

Headquartered at Peterson Air Force Base, U.S. Northern Command (USNORTHCOM) and North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) have complementary missions. USNORTHCOM coordinates military assistance to conduct homeland defense and civil support operations. NORAD conducts aerospace warning, aerospace control, and maritime warning in the defense of the nation.



National Guard and Other **Reserve Components**

The Guard and Reserve organize, train, and equip citizen soldiers/airmen to ensure their rapid mobilization for duties within the state, nation, and around the world. While all Reserve Components have a federal mission to augment active duty forces in times of crises, the Guard has the additional, unique mission of serving the Governor during state emergencies. Guard and Reserve units are stationed throughout the state.



Bucklev Air Force Base The Air Force's newest base, Buckley currently provides missile warning and defense, technical intelligence, satellite command and control, battle space characterization and robust communications. It hosts the Colorado Air National Guard, the Army National Guard's Army Aviation Support Facility and other military organizations.

Air Force Space Command

Headquartered at Peterson Air Force Base, Headquarters Air Force Space Command (AFSPC) supports U.S. military operations worldwide through the use of many different types of satellite, launch, and cyber operations. Approximately 41,000 professionals, assigned to 85 locations worldwide and deployed to an additional 35 global locations, perform AFSPC missions



Fort Carson

Fort Carson comprises about 138,500 acres that are used for mounted and dismounted maneuver training, airborne training and weapons training (small arms, tank, artillery and helicopters). Fort Carson is home to a variety of Army combat and combat support units, including the 4th Infantry Division Headquarters. It also supports the Colorado Army and Air National Guard, as well as Army and Navy Reserve.



Piñon Canyon Maneuver Site Comprising about 237,000 acres, the training site can support a full range of training, including brigade-level, force-on-force maneuvers. It provides a unique training resource, with the arid, high desert climate allowing for year round training
