

Kentucky National Guard

The National Guard is the only military force with a dual mission, serving both the Governor and President in time of national crisis. KNG is comprised of approximately 8,500 Soldiers and Airmen in the Army and Air National Guard. KNG assists the federal government in combat and peace-time, participates in the Global War on Terror, and supports U.S. military missions at global hotspots. Stateside National Guard units located at regional armories and major military training centers are prepared to assist communities during disasters and emergencies.





Fort Campbell

Strategically located on the TN/KY state line, the 106,700 acre installation has the unique capability to deploy mission-ready contingency forces by air, rail, highway, and inland waterway. Fort Campbell houses the world's only Air Assault Division, two prestigious Special Operations Command Units, and various sizable medical and dental activities. The installation supports active and reserve component units, Army civilians, Army Families, retirees, and veterans.

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Fort Knox

Fort Knox encompasses 109,000 acres and boasts sole responsibility for all Soldier career management, from swearing in to departing service. Its units include the Army Cadet Command, Army Human Resources Command, and Army Recruiting Command. These units, along with the 1st Infantry Division, the 3rd Expeditionary Sustainment Command, the 84th Training Command, Ireland Army Community Hospital, and other "Partners in Excellence" make Fort Knox the most multi-functional military base in the U.S. Army.



Blue Grass Army Depot

Blue Grass AD provides munitions, chemical defense equipment, and ammunition support to the joint warfighter. The Depot is DoD's primary center for surveillance, receipt, storage, issue, testing, and minor repair for the Chemical Defense Equipment Program. The 14,494-acre site, composed mainly of open fields and wooded areas, is used for munitions storage, general supplies repair, and munitions disposal.
